Course Description: An overview of concepts, processes, and modes of communicating with visual media to effectively generate design proposals.

Course Overview

This online course provides an introduction to visualization as a method of developing and communicating ideas. It will present content centered on visual theory and applications, as well as opportunities to practice visualization in multiple modes to support thinking and presentation. These methods will be engaged through short frequent exercises, experimental activities, and evaluated visual projects. Consistent activities of visualization practice and discussion will encourage the development of observation, reflection, and communication skills commonly applied in design.

Design 3305 introduces why and how we can use visualization, active observation, developing and organizing ideas visually, various styles of drawing/mark making techniques, and visually presenting information.

Format

The format of the class will include some synchronous and some asynchronous activity; participation is required in each. Each class will begin with a synchronous video meeting via Zoom. This synchronous format may include lecture, class discussion, or drawing activities.

Asynchronous class activities may include discussion boards on Carmen, reading/watching content, multi-group discussion, or written/creative assignments. Synchronous instruction will average 3 hours per week. There is an expectation that students will spend a minimum of 6 hours per week outside of synchronous instruction time working

on assignments, reviewing content, or participating in discussions. Active class time (both synchronous and asynchronous) is 2 hours 40 minutes twice per week.

Course Learning Objectives

At the successful completion of the course the student will be able to:

- Define visualization applications and their role in thinking and presentation.
- Apply active observation of subject matter to leverage visible and invisible qualities to support visualization process.
- Define and apply foundational visual principles and concepts such as image composition and color theory.
- Apply visualization methods as a way to think through problems, reflect on ideas, organize information, and present it with specificity.
- Analyze ideas/content and apply visualization as method of representing your interpretation.
- Apply iterative sketching to generate and evaluate ideas before presentation.
- Explore and apply drawing techniques such as linear perspective, gesture drawing, and visual note taking.
- Recognize opportunities for visualization to improve communication and idea generation in a variety of professional practices.

MATERIALS

Course Materials and Tools

Students will be expected to participate in various mark making and drawing activities throughout the course and should have required supplies available during all class meeting times.

Required materials/tools are listed below. Optional, but recommended, tools are in *italics*.

Drawing Surface:

- Notebook paper
- 8x11 printer paper
- *Sketchpad or drawing paper*

For in-class activities, any notebook paper is fine. However, for evaluated exercises and projects, it is recommended that the minimum quality of paper be 8x11 printer paper. Students are welcome to use dedicated sketchbooks or quality drawing paper if they wish, but it is not required.

Tools:

- 2B drawing pencil
- Colored pencil or marker
- Ruler or straight edge
- *Scissors*
- *Kneaded Eraser*
- *Pen or Marker*

It is important to use a proper graphite drawing pencil when we explore evaluated assignments; 2B or HB pencil is a good flexible tool that responds to pressure and line weight. This one pencil will perform well for all drawing activities. Colored tools will also be useful with either pencil or marker (pencil recommended). Students will be permitted to perform some drawing exercises digitally if they prefer. Physical content will be scanned to submit.

Communication:

- Zoom application
- Microphone for voice connection
- *Web cam*

Synchronous instruction mostly occurs in video call format. Therefore, it is required that students install the Zoom application. Be sure to log in with the SSO (osu.zoom.us). Students will also need a microphone for voice connection. Video connection is optional, but highly recommended to ensure optimized communication.

Scanning and Resources

There is no required printing in this course. Students will be required to scan or capture drawing exercises, daily participation, and projects for evaluation. Below is a list of resources to help with this, as well as additional applications for drawing.

There are no required digital drawing assignments, but it can be helpful to use digital tools to practice with to conserve materials or experiment more fluidly. I will preface each activity with permission or restriction to perform them digitally.

Readings

There is no required textbook for this course. All required readings will be posted to Carmen.

COMMUNICATION

Class Zoom meetings will be recorded and posted to Carmen to review, as well as an alternative for students that experience technical issues leading to disconnection or missed instruction due to absence.

ENGAGEMENT AND EVALUATION

Attendance & Participation

Attendance is evaluated based on students' presence in synchronous instruction time on Zoom for the entire duration of the meeting. Students are expected to attend all scheduled class meetings on Zoom. Failure to do so may result in a lowering of the final course grade at the instructor's discretion. Any students can miss up to **one** class without penalty. If a student misses **four** classes, it may result in a final grade of E, whether the absences are excused or not.

Excused absences require appropriate documentation submitted to the instructor within 3 days of the missed class. Instructor will determine if absence will be excused. Participation is evaluated based on completion of activities that are revealed during scheduled class time. Each class meeting (2 per week) will have a dedicated participation activity. These activities may include submitting short questions about content covered, sharing examples related to the topics, or visual activities like quick sketches.

Methods of Acquiring Points

Full project descriptions will be distributed at the start of the projects.

- **Visualization Projects:** Two projects will provide opportunities for students to apply course content in practice. Both projects will utilize all modules discussed throughout the course. P1 is a one-week project while P2 is a two-week project.
- **Weekly Sketches:** At the start of the course, students will select 1 object to visualize from a list. Each week, they will scan & submit 2 different methods of visualizing that object. This serves as an opportunity to establish a habit of drawing frequently without pressure.
- **Attendance and Participation:** Connecting to Zoom meetings and completing daily activities.
- **Responses:** Written response to weekly content

Grading

Final grade is determined based on the following:

- **Project 2** (30%)

- **Attendance & Participation** (15%)*
- **Weekly Sketches** (15%)

Deferrals

It is anticipated that all due dates will be met. However, arrangements for deferred submissions can be made for medical, university-sanctioned events, or compassionate reasons only. Students seeking deferrals should notify the instructor in advance of the original assignment due date and may be asked to submit medical and/or other documentation. Students who received an assignment deferral must submit their assignment by the date and time agreed upon by the instructor and student in order to achieve their grade as described above without late penalty. Should a deferred assignment be submitted after the agreed upon date and time, it will be graded per the late assignment policy below.

Late assignments

Assignments are due on Carmen by the set due date and times. Any assignment received after the deadline (and no deferral has been received) will be accepted up to 48 hours past due. This work will be graded but will be penalized by a 20% reduction. Assignments or projects received beyond 48 hours after the due date & time will receive a grade of E (0 points) without exception.

Extra credit or make-up assignments will not be available.

Design 3305 : Visualization as thinking

Course description

The purpose of this course is to provide a hands on approach with some tools, techniques and the mindsets necessary to solve problems. The process of visualization is a major part of the design process. This enhances one's ability to communicate ideas, concepts, and meanings that are not easily depicted, including abstract, simple or complex items. This type of thinking is not only utilized in the design world. Every discipline has benefitted from using this aspect of design thinking. Students will develop skills as visual thinkers, strategists, and storytellers through in-class activities, homework, discussion, and projects.

This is not visualization via computer software. In order to do that successfully there needs to be considerable mastery of a chosen computer program. As a result the time needed to acquire the problem solving skills, principles and techniques would be lost. Our course borrows from design pedagogy and conventional design professional practice which heavily utilizes drawing. It doesn't matter whether you "think you can draw" or not [*yes, you can*], or whether you are "visual" or "not" [*yes you are*]. this course is intended to improve your ability to look at problems, see patterns, imagine solutions, and show those solutions to others using visual representations. By the end of this course, you should be familiar with techniques, tools and principles for creating problem-solving visual representations and think and communicate visually.

Format

This is a progress-oriented course that requires active student participation. Class meets two days a week for 1 hour 20 minutes each day. The course is comprised of presentations, assignments, participatory activities and individual meetings. Students are encouraged to utilize classroom and departmental facilities.

Learning Outcomes

This course will be curated & managed through Carmen. All homework will be submitted using the Carmen dropbox unless otherwise instructed. Students must access Carmen on a regular basis since all course news and assignments will be communicated that way.

Lectures / In-class activities: Important material on techniques & tools will be covered through lectures and in-class activities. Therefore, active participation, questions, note taking & discussion are strongly encouraged.

Projects: Projects will test material discussed in class and on Carmen. Concept critiques, independent reviews, and other projects and readings may be periodically assigned to help support and supplement material relevant to topics being covered.

This course outline and content are subject to change at any time according to the discretion of the instructor or the department.

Critiques:

You are not expected to be or the work that you do will be evaluated ***as “designers”***. You will learn to become better at your work by iteration, effort and failure. I provide honest appraisals of the work ***I see***. Contrary to popular belief, what constitutes good design is not a subjective interpretation. Honest assessments of work are given so that you may learn and improve. Your effort, demonstration of the principles learned and researched are all taken into consideration. You are expected to participate in critiques.

Paradigm shift

*With each assignment I will be asking you to be reflective and critical about your work. **You will be asked to assign yourself a grade.***

The purpose of this strategy is to have you focus on acquiring **the skills, techniques, and principles that you most definitely will use in the future**. I reserve the right to change the grade after the work is reviewed. You and I may agree and the grade will remain the same. At times I may lower the grade. However I may raise the grade as well. There will be a rubrick posted with every assignment. Please be honest.

Final grade

Final grade will be determined by the sum of homework, projects, in class participation and activity. This subtotal will be out of 410 points. Points accrued from absences will be deducted from the subtotal. A final letter grade equivalent will be assigned.

The instructor reserves the right to determine the final grade.

Late assignments

Assignments (submitted PDF online or hand-in) are due at the start of class on the day of their deadline.

Any assignment received after the deadline (and no deferral has been received) will be accepted up to 72 hours past due, your work will be graded and then you will receive 70% of that grade. After 3 days, no points can be earned. It is the student's responsibility to coordinate the submission of hand-in work.

Points matter, so even a late assignment can impact your grade. Not submitting an assignment will result in an automatic zero (E) for the assignment.
