Course Description

1102 Elementary Turkish 2 is the spring part of a year-long course which aims to teach Modern Standard Turkish to students. This course is the fulfillment of the General Education (GE) requirement for the Foreign Language category. The course emphasizes four basic skills: Speaking, listening, reading and writing by reinforcing with audio-visual tools and interactive activities. This course aims to teach Modern Standard Turkish to students by introducing basic vocabularies and the fundamentals of Modern Turkish grammar, sentence structure, and pronunciation. Additionally, the course emphasizes teaching functional skills, which will enable students to communicate in the real-world environment. The course enables students to have simple conversations in Turkish, write short dialogs and read Modern Turkish. As part of the course structure, the areas of Turkish culture, history and geography will be covered and traditional arts, music and food will be introduced.

Var / yok and the verb to have
Understand cultural aspect of the language along with traditions including: Turkish coffee making, family structures, bargaining, future telling, holidays and celebrations.
Produce plurals, possessive suffixes, and commonly used derivative suffixes in written and
spoken forms of Turkish.
After successfully completing this course in the spring semester, students will be able to introduce themselves, their work and studies, ask directions, shop at the bazaar, introduce their family members, and talk about future plans, past events and their hobbies with Turkish aorist.

- A. Formal Assessment of Learning Outcomes:

- a) Speaking: Participation grade and class presentations.
- b) Listening: Assignments, exams, listening videos and watching short video clips.
- c) Reading: Assignments, exams, and class participation.
- d) Writing: Class presentations, homework assignments, quizzes and exams.
 - 2. Learning outcome number 2 is assessed through the following measures: Quizzes, class presentations, assignments and exams.
 - 3. Learning outcome number 3 is assessed through the following measures: Class presentations, quizzes, group works and exams.

How This Online Course Works

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% online. There are required sessions when you must be logged in to Carmen at a scheduled time.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into weekly modules on Carmen. The module for each week will become available at 11:59PM on the preceding Friday. Each module will contain a weekly schedule with links to daily Zoom class meetings, learning goals for the week, assignment instructions, links, and deadlines, and lecture content. It is the responsibility of each student to keep up with this weekly schedule.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 4 credit-hour course. According to Ohio State bylaws on instruction (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 4 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to [8] hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of [C] average.

This course is divided into weekly modules on Carmen. The module for each week will become available at 11:59PM on the preceding Friday. Each module will contain a weekly schedule with links to daily Zoom class meetings, learning goals for the week, assignment instructions, links, and deadlines, and lecture content. It is the responsibility of each student to keep up with this weekly schedule.

The class focuses on student-centered creative activities. Students are required to participate in these activities. Some of these activities include role-playing, participating in various games, dramatizing everyday activities such as asking directions, shopping at a local market, bargaining, renting rooms, inviting friends outside event etc. Students will prepare individual and/or group presentations. We will also have vocabulary quizzes weekly on Mondays after second week.

Tuesdays are generally a day for going over vocabulary and reading dialogs from the book. Wednesdays the grammar of the week will be introduced. Please read the grammar sections in the chapter from the book before our online meetings. Thursdays, we will read the dialogues in the book and complete exercises. Please attend our online sessions having read the dialogues and the reading sections of the chapter. On Fridays or Tuesdays first 10 minutes, you will have role play exercises or present your presentation (if it is assigned for that week). On Fridays for thirty minutes, we will watch a new Turkish dizi /tele-novella "Black Money Love" from Netflix. And we will watch a Turkish movie of Organize İşler for the final written assignment part of the exam. Movie section is mandatory for the class. You will post your comments about the movie to the discussion page of Carmen when it is assigned.

Students are responsible for their own learning. I recommend that they keep notebook during this term and record their own progress and difficulties with the language. They can write their daily activities or keep a daily or weekly journal in Turkish. Students are also free to emphasize their own interests in the class. For example; those who are interested in history may put more emphasis on their reading skills and working on speaking or writing about historical characters they are interested in. Although each student has to develop their four basic skills, they are free to work on developing their language skills in an area that interests them.

You should plan for 2 hours of homework (including active reading, listening, vocabulary learning and review, preparing and/or recording speaking tasks, writing, and grammar practice) every day.

Attendance and participation requirements: Because this is an online course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. The following is a summary of students' expected participation:

This is a fully online 14-week Fall course beginning Tuesday, August 25th, with a mandatory synchronous element. You will attend daily required sessions on Carmen Zoom, Tuesday through Friday, 3:00-3:55 PM EST. You will also be required to attend a minimum of four 15-minute one-on-one online meetings with the instructor, which will be scheduled at the start of the course.

Students are expected to attend the entire class session. Each day of your absentee will affect your performance on the tests, quizzes and homework. If you miss a class or come to class unprepared, you will not be able to learn the material fully, which would affect your language learning goals and put your pace behind of your classmates.

You will be allowed a total of two absences during the semester without the need for official documentation. Please do not interpret these days as free days and use them wisely for unforeseeable events including non-emergency medical appointments, weddings, family plans, etc. Please inform me about your absence in advance by e-mail.

Lateness: Students who log in to Zoom 15 minutes or later after the beginning of a class will be marked as late attendance. Three late attendances will become an absence. If you pass the attendance limit, you will lose points from your attendance, which is 10% of your grade. If

you are absent during quizzes, you will lose your quiz points. If you miss the final exam, you will lose all your final exam points.

Some absences may only be excused for an acceptable, verifiable reason including medical emergencies, family emergencies, or officially excused university related absences (conference attendances, athlete's practices). Official documentation must be presented to the instructor for the absence to be excused. It is your responsibility to contact me in a timely manner to make up tests or quizzes, if you miss the class.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **weekly modules** that are released one week ahead of time. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 4-credit-hour course. According to Ohio State policy (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 4 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 8 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of (C) average.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 4-credit-hour course. According to Ohio State policy, students should expect around 2 hours of homework per hour of direct instruction to receive a grade of (C) average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Because this is an online course, your attendance is

for every hour of class time. This means that in a typical week, you should expect to spend at least twenty (8) hours doing your Turkish assignments. Homework will be a significant part of instruction. It is important that you complete your assignments in a timely fashion. When new information is presented in class that will be reinforced through homework.

Written Assignments (Yazılı Ödevler):

All written homework will be submitted online, through the course Carmen site, unless otherwise noted in the instructions for the assignment. Assignments can be accepted by email as well if it is informed beforehand. The homework schedule for each week will become available at 11:59PM on the preceding Friday.

Written assignments (essays, grammar and vocabulary practice, scripts, etc.) can be submitted in MS Word or PDF formats. Some of your written assignments will be typed (you will receive instruction on typing in Turkish) while others can be handwritten and scanned or photographed for upload. All written assignments should be formatted as follows:

- Type or write your name at the top of each page.
- Leave at least 1-inch margins on all sides.
- Skip every other line (leave enough space between lines for corrections and comments).

Online Speaking Assignments (Online Konuşma Ödevleri) :

You will complete several types of speaking tasks as part of this course: weekly prompts, daily Zoom conversations, class role-play acts, and three presentations.

Daily Zoom Conversations (Günlük Zoom Konuşmaları)

You will be expected to participate in whole-class, small group, or pair conversations during daily Zoom sessions. Please use the conversation time actively to practice new vocabulary and grammar rules that we focus on that day or week.

Presentations (Sunumlar):

You will prepare and deliver a total of six (3) in-class presentations during this course.

A sign-up sheet, detailed instructions, and Grading Rubric for the presentations will be posted in the Welcome Module on Carmen. Your presentations will be on a topic of chapter that is studied, 10-15 minutes in length. You may include slides, images, or demonstrations, depending on the topic. You will be required to submit your topic and written script for your presentations at least three (3) days before your scheduled presentation slot in order to receive my feedback.

Quizzes and Exams (Test ve Sinavlar):

There will be three types of assessments in this course –online vocabulary guizzes or online grammar quizzes, which includes grammar rules of the chapters that are studied, two (2) take- home written tests, two online speaking exams and a take home final exam and a speaking exam.

Vocabulary Quizzes (Kelime Testleri)

During daily Zoom class session (each Monday after second week), students will take their guiz on Mondays as an assignment. These quizzes will be graded on completion.

Online Grammar Quizzes (Online Testler)

Short quizzes on Carmen will assess ongoing learning and comprehension of the material besides vocabularies. These quizzes will be available on Mondays when it is necessary. You will be allowed three attempts on these quizzes and will be encouraged to keep retaking the misiposciscore

Department of Near Eastern Languages and Cultures (NELC)

reaches at minimum 85-90%. Only your highest grade will be recorded.

Take-Home Written Tests, Speaking Exams, and Essay Submissions (Eve Götürülen Yazılı Sınavlar)

There will be two small take home exams during the quarter. Take-home written tests will be given on weeks 5 and 12. These take-home exams will be a performance test, which will assess students in the three major proficiency areas: listening, reading and writing. The written portion will be emailed on Tuesday via Carmen email and the due will be during the class time at the same day. And speaking test will be posted on Carmen during the class time on Wednesday and the due will be during the class time at the same day. Essay submission will be posted via Carmen at the same day of speaking exam.

Final Exam (Final Sinavi):

Take-home written exam will be given during the 15th week. You will have one hour to complete the exam and submit immediately when you finish the exam. The final exam covers the materials presented from chapter 1 through chapter 16 (Chapter 20 partially). Since this is a language class, we cannot omit any kind of information that is studied previously. Students are responsible from the assigned units and all handout assignments that will be studied in the class. There will be no make-up for the final exam.

Speaking Exams (Konuşma Sınavı):

Additionally, there will be a speaking exam, which will be posted on Carmen. Students will listen audio files and record their answers and post on Carmen on Wednesday of the week 5 and 12 and during the final exam of week 15. You will be required to audio- or video-record short responses to questions or prompts that you listened on Carmen. These tasks will be graded for completion for two midterms and one final exam. The feedback will be provided to help you correct major errors.

Academic integrity and collaboration: It is expected from you to complete homework assignments, tests, and final exam yourself, without any external help or communication. The use of Google Translate or similar online translation tools is prohibited. However, you can use online dictionaries such as seslisozluk.com or tureng.com while you are working on your assignments, but not tests and final exam. All of your written assignments should be your own original work. This class will provide you opportunities to collaborate with your classmates to complete group study assignments. However, working with classmates to complete quizzes and tests are not permitted.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Turkish 1102 is the second semester of elementary Turkish. Elementary Turkish I (TURK 1101) or equivalence is required. Students continue to acquire Turkish language competencies through consistent effort and iterative practice. This course teaches listening, reading, speaking and writing.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES: Upon completion of this course, student will be able to express concepts and ideas at the elementary level in the Turkish language. They will possess a basic understanding of the grammatical logic of Turkish, its alphabet and phonetics and common forms of daily use. Students will also learn, discover and discuss Turkish culture, history, politics and daily life appropriate for this level.

Note: This course is part of a University Institute of Teaching and Learning (UITL) Research Implementation project. You have the option of participating in the research. The benefits and risks of your involvement in this study will be described in person by the research team. Your participation is completely optional and your choice to participate will not impact your grade. If you choose to participate, your completion of two surveys and one interview will earn up to 5% of your final grade. If you choose not to participate, this 5% will be distributed elsewhere in the grading.

Intercultural Development Inventory: 5% (total, both components)

Complete pre- and post-surveys: 2.5% Complete mid-semester interview: 2.5%

Intercultural Development Inventory (5%)

As part of your experience in the class this semester, you may participate in activities for intercultural development. These include two surveys (pre and post) that take up to 20 minutes each to complete, as well as a mid-semester interview that will last up to 30 minutes. More information will be provided.

GENERAL EDUCATION: This course fulfills OSU's Foreign Language Gen. Ed. (GE) requirement.

Goals: Students demonstrate skills in communication across ethnic, cultural, ideological, and national boundaries, and appreciate other cultures and patterns of thought.

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Expected Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students employ communicative skills (speaking, listening, reading, and/or writing) in a language other than their native language.
- 2. Students describe and analyze the cultural contexts and manifestations of the peoples who speak the language that they are studying.
- 3. Students compare and contrast the cultures and communities of the language that they are studying with their own.

This class integrates language acquisition with cultural learning and discovery. Examples and activities are relevant to the historical and contemporary Turkish context. Communicative events, homework and presentations combine appropriate-level grammar forms with topics that "make sense" with on-the-ground lifeways of Turkey. Students will thus learn how to navigate simple, everyday events in-country, preparing them for possible future trips to Turkey as well interactions with Turkish communities.

TEACHING METHOD: Lecture, Participation, Assignments, Presentations, Quizzes and Tests.

REQUIRED TEXTS:

Elementary Turkish: A Complete Course for Beginners, by Kurtuluş Öztopcu. Two Volumes. Revised Third Edition. Please makes sure that you purchase the 3rd Edition!

RECOMMENDED TEXTS:

- A Student Grammar of Turkish, by F. Nihan Ketrez
- A small, portable Turkish-English dictionary.

ASSIGNMENTS and CLASS COMPONENTS: Language competency builds on previous material, it is vital to stay up-to-date with grammar, vocabulary and relevant skills. It is difficult to catch up if you fall behind. Doing some work every day is much better than doing a lot of work once a week.

Semi-Immersion Language Acquisition Strategy: Half our class periods will be conducted entirely in Turkish. (To keep it simple, all-Turkish days will be Tuesdays and Thursdays). Come prepared to speak and hear *only* Turkish from the beginning to the end of class. *Persistent use of English during these classes will negatively affect your participation grade*. On the first day of class the instructor will teach "phrases of instruction," so you can say, for example, that you did or didn't understand something. On non-Turkish days, you are still expected to do as much as possible in Turkish, however, you may ask some questions in English and the instructor may give explanations in English.

Graded Course Components:

Participation: Students are expected to participate verbally in class. The instructor will involve everyone, but each person is expected to volunteer answers and comments. *Please come to class on-time, prepared, with homework out and books open. Please have all electronic devices turned to silent mode and remove headphones or earbuds.*

Homework: Homework assignments will be given daily, with longer assignments over the weekend. Come prepare to turn in your homework every time it is assigned, although sometimes we will review and correct it in class. Please don't merely do the homework, **make sure you understand all the**

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words associated with each assignment.

Please note that homework also includes attending three (3) events this semester pertinent to Turkey and Turkish culture. See the syllabus for dates, times and locations. After each event, write a minimum of 250 words (in English) to summarize what you learned, observed or discovered. The IDI (mentioned above) will count as one (1) event towards the fulfillment of these requirements. Various events and activities are offered throughout the semester.

Quizzes and Exams: Regular quizzes ensure that students keep up with regular content. Midterms and Finals may cover all material previous to that particular test.

Reference Notebook (optional): All students are encouraged to keep a "reference notebook" that contains all grammar points, vocabulary and relevant examples. This is in addition to the daily notes taken in class. The reference notebook is an opportunity to legibly re-copy important concepts and keep track of them in an organized fashion. For students who choose to continue in Turkish, a well-organized reference notebook will serve the language-learning process.

ATTENDANCE: Regular, consistent effort is imperative for language mastery. Therefore, attendance affects the overall participation score. Students are allowed four absences for any reason, with no penalty. These absences are meant, for example, to cover a doctor's appointment, an illness or a family crisis. I suggest you save these for serious situations. Beyond these four, additional absences will have a 2.5% negative impact on your overall grade. This is in addition to affecting your participation grade. Please contact me by email as soon as you know that you cannot attend a class regardless of reason. If possible, provide documentation (like a doctor's note) pertaining to the absence. You will still incur a grade penalty, but perhaps less than 2.5%, at my discretion.

TARDINESS: I will start class on time. **Three (3)** tardies count as **one** absence. Leaving class early is considered a tardy. If you occasionally must be late or leave early, please let me know in advance.

GRADING: Final course grade will include in-class participation, homework, presentations, quizzes and exams. Remember that absences above **four** and tardies above **three** will lower the final grade.
