HOW THIS ONLINE COURSE WORKS

Overview: This class serves as an extended orientation for first semester students who are pursuing majors in the College of Arts and Sciences. Its purpose is to help you make a successful transition to academic life at Ohio State. Please keep in mind that although this course will be online and there are no lectures (in person or online), you will be required to meet once (virtually) with your assigned academic advisor. You will be expected to follow the course schedule in the syllabus and in Carmen to complete assignments, readings, and quizzes. Each assignment has a specific deadline. This course does not require exams. Instead, you will complete a final project, consisting of the Degree Audit Assignment and Schedule Projection. These assignments are due no later than **Wednesday, October 13**, and you will submit them to your advisor in an appointment. Descriptions of all the course assignments are below.

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% online. There are no required sessions when you must be logged in to Carmen at a scheduled time.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **weekly modules**. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a **1-credit-hour course**. According to Ohio State policy (<u>go.osu.edu/credithours</u>), students should expect around 1 hour per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 2 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of "S."

Attendance and participation requirements:

Because this is an online course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. As with all university courses, class attendance is not optional; it is expected. The following is a summary of students' expected participation:

• Participating in online activities for attendance:

You are expected to log in to the course in Carmen every week. (During most weeks you will probably log in many times.) If you have a situation that might cause you to miss a class, discuss it with one of the instructors as soon as possible. Excused absences include illnesses for which you have a doctor's note or other documented extenuating circumstances.

How your grade is calculated

Grading

Arts and Sciences 1100.04 is graded Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory (S/U). In order to earn a grade of Satisfactory, you must earn a minimum of 80% (148 points out of 185 possible). You are expected to complete all assignments on the published due dates. Points will be deducted for late work unless prior arrangements have been made with the instructor. This is a 7-week Session 1 course, so it is imperative that you pay close attention to assignment deadlines and due dates.

Descriptions of major course assignments

Successful completion of this course requires that you:

- You are required to complete a reading and the corresponding 5-point quiz on the following topics: 1) Adding & Dropping Classes: Deadlines & Procedures; 2) The General Education Curriculum; 3) Scheduling; 4) Grades & Academic Standing; and 5) Academic Misconduct & Plagiarism.
- Each has a specific due date and will be completed in Carmen.
- The quizzes are set up so that you can take each quiz unlimited times to increase your score. Your highest score for each quiz will be used in final grade calculation.

• Complete the Degree Audit Report Assignment

- Print off a Degree Audit Report from Buckeye Link: click on the Academics and Records icon and then click on the Degree Audit icon.
- Write in the missing courses on the degree audit report with your choices for the GE and major requirements.
- Whenever you see a red 'X' mark, use the GE sheets (links available Carmen) and information about your major on the department website, and write in the course(s) on your Degree Audit so that your advisor is aware of the specific course(s) you plan to take to fulfill any unmet requirements. If you have areas with green check marks, no additional course work is required for that category.
- Be sure to calculate your upper division and total hours to make certain you plan for elective courses, if needed.
- You may have classes appearing in the section labeled "course work counted towards graduation but not used toward a specific GE or major requirement" that you think might fit into a GE or major course requirement. If so, bring copies of the course syllabi to the meeting with your assigned advisor.
- You will submit this assignment to your assigned academic advisor in a scheduled meeting.

- Fill in the courses you plan on taking for each semester for the next four terms (minimum) or until you will have completed your degree (whichever comes first).

- **Backing up your work**: Consider composing your academic posts in a word processor, where you can save your work, and then copying into the Carmen discussion.
