

SYLLABUS GERMAN 1103.01 GERMAN III (4 CREDIT HOURS) Autumn 2021

COURSE OVERVIEW

Course description

German 1103.01 is a course designed to develop and expand your skills in German as you explore ideas, cultural topics and themes from the German-speaking world. This course conforms to goals set by the <u>European Common Framework of Reference for Languages</u> at the A2 level.

General education expected learning outcomes

German 1103.01 is an intermediate-level introduction to the German language and Germanspeaking cultures. It is a course that builds on the structures that were introduced in 1101 and 1102. It is the third of a three-semester course sequence designed to address the goals of category **1. Skills: C. Foreign Language of OSU's General Education Curriculum:**

Goals

Foreign Language coursework develops students' skills in communication across ethnic, cultural, ideological, and national boundaries, and an understanding and appreciation of other cultures and patterns of thought.

Expected Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students employ communicative skills (e.g. speaking, listening, reading, and/or writing) in a language other than their native language.
- 2. Students describe and analyze the cultural contexts and manifestations of the peoples who speak the language that they are studying.
- 3. Students compare and contrast the cultures and communities of the language that they are studying with their own.

Placement Tests

You are required to fill out the "Student Information Form" on the course's CARMEN CANVAS site to ensure that you are taking the appropriate level of German. If your last German language

class was in junior and/or senior high school, you are required to take the language Placement Test. If your instructor finds that you need to take the German language placement test, you must do so promptly. The German placement test is a computerized exam, administered by the *Center for Languages, Literatures, and Cultures.* You can find more information on here: <u>https://germanic.osu.edu/foreign-language-placement-testing</u>. Note: The Book-Codes to *Blinklearning* are valid for 12 months. If you are continuing on to German 1103 directly from German 1102, then your *Blink Learning Book Code* from last semester is likely still valid. If you have not taken German 1102 in the past semester, you will likely need to purchase the Book-Code again.

If you are a sponsored student, please be aware that you can get all your course materials, textbook and the access code to the digital workbook, through the bookstore.

We will complete chapters 5-12 in Netzwerk A2.

Fees

TalkAbroad Conversation: You are required to complete 1 thirty-minute conversation with a German speaker conversation partner on <u>TalkAbroad</u>, a video-conferencing platform. The price for **1 thirty-minute conversation is \$15**.

HOW THIS COURSE WORKS

Mode of delivery: This course is taught 100% in person and meets four times a week.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a **4-credit-hour course**. According to Ohio State policy (<u>go.osu.edu/credithours</u>), students should expect around 4 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (e.g., instructor content and Carmen activities) in addition to 8 hours of homework (e.g., digital workbook activities, preparing and completing assignments) to receive a grade of (C) average.

Attendance and participation expectations: Your attendance is based on your active participation in class sessions. REGULAR ATTENDANCE will give you the opportunity to practice using the language with others and to receive feedback from your instructor. Therefore, you are encouraged to attend class regularly, volunteer often and participate actively. Making errors is natural and part of your language development, so it is necessary that you make your best effort to speak German at all times, and do not wait to be called on before speaking. The following class participation scale is used to assess your weekly performance grade:

100%	high level of preparation; active participation in class activities and partner/group work; uses German almost exclusively; asks questions or volunteers information.	
90%	regularly prepared; frequent participation in class activities and partner/group work; makes a conscious effort to use as much German as possible; volunteers answers to open questions (not directed at anyone).	
80%	usually prepared, but preparation inconsistent; some participation in class activities and partner/group work; uses German when required.	
70%	rarely prepared; rarely able to answer when called on; rarely volunteers.	
0-60%	not prepared for class; does not participate.	

Work outside of class sessions: Regular practice and preparation are necessary for steady development and success in language learning. Therefore, there will be daily homework assigned, so you can study the new materials and practice listening, reading, writing, and speaking German outside the class. You will have homework from the digital workbook portion of *Netzwerk A2: Deutsch als Fremdsprache, Arbeitsbuch and* other supplementary instructional materials (powerpoints and activities) available on the CARMEN CANVAS course website.

Regular work with the audio and video programs will help you greatly to understand, pronounce, and speak German. If you work with the listening materials on a consistent basis you will have a distinct advantage in the classroom and on the listening comprehension portion of each test. We also recommend that you take advantage of extracurricular opportunities such as our weekly

Kaffeestunde to practice your German language skills. Check our <u>department's website</u> for details about *Kaffeestunde* and the German Club.

How to succeed in this course: Becoming proficient in a world language (in your case, German) means developing culturally appropriate language SKILLS in addition to understanding how the language works. Language skills are developed through continuous and meaningful PRACTICE, including practice in using the language to communicate with others. In this course, we will use a variety of practice activities and language tasks that require you to interact with others. These are designed to supplement the INDIVIDUAL STUDY and preparation that you can do best by yourself at home. You will find that REGULAR rather than sporadic PREPARATION is essential for steady progress and good performance. Review lessons every day and review them at least for a period of 45-60 minutes each time. Keep up with your lessons! Language learning is cumulative. Timely completion of homework helps reinforce your learning and keep you up to date in class.

Attendance: Attendance is mandatory. Absenteeism will affect your course performances in indirect and direct ways; however, because of the exceptional COVID-19 pandemic circumstances, we are aware that you may need to miss class to see a doctor if you're not feeling well, if you came in contact with someone who tested positive, or you contracted the virus and will need to quarantine. We are also aware that "excusable" situations arise such as, jury duty, military commitments, death/illness in the family. Note that having to work is not an excusable situation. If you miss class or know you are going to miss class, you are required to send the following email message to your instructor within 24 hours:

I, **NAME**, certify that I am missing class for an excusable reason. (You may elaborate if you wish).

If your absence is due to illness, please add the following: Due to illness, I expect that I will miss <u>NUMBER</u> days/weeks of class. (You may elaborate if you wish).

If you fail to contact your instructor, your absence will be considered unexcused. At the fourth absence without contacting your instructor, the following policy is in place:

4 days missed w/o contact: final grade lowered by one whole grade (A becomes B); **8 days** missed w/o contact: final grade lowered by two whole grades (A becomes C); **12 and more days** missed w/o contact): final grade lowered by three whole grades (A becomes D);

16 and more days missed w/o contact): final grade will change to E.

Descriptions of major course assignments

Quizzes:

Quizzes will be online. Their purpose is to provide your instructor and yourself feedback on your learning of German vocabulary and grammar.

Tests:

You will take 4 tests: Test 1 (Kapitel 5-6), Test 2 (Kapitel 7-8), Test 3 (Kapitel 9-10), and Test 4 (Kapitel 11-12). Dates for all chapter tests will be announced in advance. All tests will be online.

Tests and other assessments will be graded on a percentage basis. Missed tests, quizzes or any other graded assessment activities will count as ZERO. Only in the case of verifiable (documented) illness or emergency or other COVID-19 related reasons which prevent you from taking the test (see note under attendance) will a make-up be given.

Speaking Assessments:

Your ability to speak and understand spoken German will be assessed in the form of a number of activities that demonstrate your progress in speaking German. The following are types of activities/assignments you will be asked to complete:

- 1 Monologue (Stell Dich vor)
- 1 Präsentation
- 2 Conversation with your instructor and a classmate
- 1 TalkAbroad Conversation (sign up to meet and conduct a conversation with a native speaker)

All speaking activities will be announced in advance. Detailed instructions along with rubric for these assignments will be made available on the course's CARMEN CANVAS site.

Note: You will need to <u>pay a fee of \$15</u> to meet with a native speaker conversation partner for 30 minutes via *TalkAbroad*.

Writing Assignments:

Your ability to write in German will be assessed in the form of short writing assignments. Each assignment will focus on a particular genre, for example, writing a blog entry, a comment, or an email. Your instructor will provide you with specific instruction including the grading criteria. You will be asked to submit these assignments to the course's dropbox (on CARMEN). This is a graded assignment.

Late assignments

Late submissions will not be accepted. Please refer to Carmen for due dates.

- Mute your microphone when you are not speaking.
- Only your instructor has the permission to record the class.
- Make sure the place where you're at during your class Zoom meeting is quiet and welllit.
- Do not move or drive during your class Zoom meeting. It's not only distracting but it's also not safe!
- Turn-off your email, your cell phone, social media, etc. during the class.
- Log in at least 2-3 minutes before class to make sure you're in class on time.
- To participate in class discussion, use the digital hand feature in Zoom.
- If possible, use a headphone with microphone
