Good afternoon,

On Wednesday, Feb. 9th, the Race, Ethnicity and Gender Diversity Panel of the ASC Curriculum Committee reviewed a course proposal for AAAS 1112.

The Panel unanimously approved the request with three recommendations:

- *Recommendation:* The Panel recommends that the department include intersectionality in the course description (syllabus pg. 1).
- *Recommendation:* The Panel strongly recommends that the due dates for all assignments be incorporated into the class schedule (syllabus pg. 6-8 under “Course schedule”).
- *Recommendation:* The Panel recommends that the course schedule include not only readings and assignments, but also class topics or central questions that will be addressed in each class meeting. They encourage the department to include some of the excellent information provided in the GE Submission Form when formulating these topics and/or central questions.

AAAS 1112 will continue through the approval process.
