## Mus 2249: European Music Traditions (3 credit hours)

<u>Overview</u>: This is a selective survey of European art music, and Europe-diasporic traditions in other parts of the world, from the mid 16<sup>th</sup> century through the present. Students will acquire a foundational understanding of European Classical Music tradition and the worldviews and philosophies that have informed and emerged from that historical practice. The course will discuss specific histories of musical style, including some traditional composers-and-works approaches to music history. Students will also come to understand how figures peripheral to mainstream European traditions — including musicians in the U.S. and in Latin America — have adapted and ultimately transformed those traditions. The primary emphasis will be on European-derived music as they intertwine with a history of ideas, as well as with cultural, social, and aesthetic developments. Assigned musical works and practices will be discussed in detail, with music scores in hand.

<u>Lecture + recitation format</u>, totaling 3 contact hours/week: attendance is expected in both lectures and recitations

- Lectures: Mondays and Wednesdays, 10:20-11:15 a.m., Timashev 100
- <u>Recitation sections</u>: Fridays, with three review/discussion sections led by the GTA (9:10-10:05 a.m., 10:20-11:15 a.m., 12:40-1:35 p.m.); and one "focus" section led by Dr. Ashby (10:20-11:15 a.m.), which will go beyond the course assignments to explore additional issues, details, and contexts

<u>Course materials</u>: there is no textbook for the course; all materials will be available on CarmenCanvas (under the "modules" tab), including daily assigned readings, course assignments, test reviews, etc. The online postings will include all listening and viewing examples (music videos, audio recordings, etc.).

<u>Class announcements</u>: I will send all important class-wide messages through the Announcements tool in CarmenCanvas. Please check your notification preferences (go.osu.edu/canvas-notifications) to ensure you receive these.

<u>Attendance policy</u>: There is no such thing as day-to-day excused absences for this course, you're either present for a given class period, or unable to attend. Just keep track of your absences, and be sure you don't miss many classes. Accommodations will be made, of course, for extended illnesses and any emergency interruptions to the semester. Assignments & grading:

- Three non-cumulative 50-minute <u>tests</u> incorporating about 34 multiple-choice questions and a 100-word essay (2/6, 3/29, 4/23); the third test will be slightly longer than the rest and will serve as the final exam. Tests 1 & 2 will each count as 20% of the term grade, while test 3 will count as 20%. These tests will measure your level of engagement with the daily course materials. = totaling <u>60% of semester grade</u>
- An 800-1000-word **program note** on a relevant music piece of your choice, possibly a piece that you have performed or will perform. Your program note must *introduce* the music to an audience, but must also show awareness of the themes, issues, perspectives, and concepts that are discussed in this course. This assignment is intended to help you develop skills in (i) locating dependable information, (ii) synthesizing information and knowledge, and (iii) packaging your discoveries to make them useful in daily life outside a classroom = <u>15% of semester grade</u>
- Produce a <u>five-minute podcast</u> by meeting with your three other assigned podcast group members, and deciding on an issue relating to the musical traditions in our course purview. Be sure that everyone is involved in discussion, and your podcast members must collaborate to draw some kind of conclusion. This assignment is designed to help you (i) connect with classmates, (ii) locate and define important issues on your own, (iii) cooperate productively with colleagues in a time marked by dogma, resentment, and insularity, and (iv) learn how to compromise and iron out differences of opinion within a working group. Each person's contribution will be graded independently = <u>15% of semester grade</u>
- Attend lectures and participate in the <u>Friday sections</u> every week, and answer the posted discussion questions in person and in section quizzes = <u>10% of semester grade</u>
