Dear Luke and members of the Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee.

On March 22, 2022, the ASCC's Social and Behavioral Sciences Panel reviewed and approved a new certificate called Sustainable and Resilient Social and Ecological Systems (SARSES). The outstanding assessment-related contingencies were approved by me on April 8, 2022.

SARSES is a 14 credit hour, category 1a (stand-alone), 1b (embedded), and 2 (post-bac) certificate housed in the Department of Anthropology and overseen by faculty in a range of departments, including: Earth Sciences; History; Geography; English; Evolution, Ecology and Organismal Biology; and, Civil, Environmental and Geodetic Engineering. The certificate trains students in a broad field of sustainability- and resilience- related sciences, and integrates content from across campus in the areas of human-natural systems, environmental and earth systems, society and culture, and health and well-being. The certificate requires that students take ANTHROP 3050: Social and Ecological Systems: From Problems to Prospects (4 credit hours) as well as ANTHROP 3051: Sustainable and Resilient Social and Ecological Systems Capstone Portfolio (1 credit hour). Both classes have been successfully vetted by the SBS panel. The certificate could be feasibly completed in a two-year, four-semester window.

We advance the SARSES certificate to the Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee with a motion to approve.
