- 5. Credits in the Major Area of Concentration have increased from 34 to 35 and elective credits reduced from 16 to 15.

The School of Music inform us that one of the reasons for the revision is that the curriculum sheets for this program have not been updated in over 20 years. The three advisors have kept the programs up-to-date in terms of coursework and practicums by using independent study courses or via course substitutions. With these revisions, the degree sheets are now congruent with what students accomplish over the course of their program. Furthermore, most of the DMA conductors will likely get their first jobs in schools smaller than the Ohio State University. Those schools seek new faculty who can teach conducting in multiple disciplines. The revised programs therefore allow DMA students to remain specialists while also developing skills that would serve the non-ensemble needs of a small music department. The changes do not negatively impact rigor or the focus of the program, and the revised program should easily pass the review of the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM) accreditation body.

We advance the proposal for the revised Doctor of Musical Arts in Conducting to the Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee with a motion to approve.

Rationale and List of Changes

The curriculum sheets for this program have not been updated in over 20 years. The three advisors have kept the programs up to date in terms of coursework and practicums by using independent study courses or via course substitutions. Due to these revisions, the degree sheets are now congruent with what students accomplish over the course of their program.

Furthermore, most of our DMA conductors will get their first jobs in schools smaller than the Ohio State University. Those schools seek new faculty who can teach conducting in multiple disciplines. The revised programs allow our DMA students to remain specialists while also developing skills that would serve the non-ensemble needs of a small music department.

Unlike the more recent changes within the School's graduate programs, revisions to the DMA in Conducting were not impacted to a significant extent by School of Music, College, or University actions related to changes in personnel or funding.

The changes do not negatively impact rigor nor the focus of the program, and the revised program would easily pass the review of our accreditation body, the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM). Students currently enrolled in this program will not be negatively impacted by these changes. Substitutions will be made, as needed, and time to graduation will not be adversely affected.

The degree of change for each track relative to the current program is as follows:

- 1. Orchestral Emphasis 10%
- 2. Wind Emphasis 10%
- 3. Choral Emphasis 4%

The percentages referenced above are due to newly added courses, Music 8905, Music 8193, and Music 6812.

The revised curriculum sheets for each track will become the new advising sheets used by advisors and their students.

To provide a diction review of French, German, and Italian Coaching in musical expression and style

Course Description:

This course will serve as a review for graduate students who have already had training in the major foreign languages used in singing (German, French, and Italian.)

Fundamental and advanced concepts will be addressed in class and in the readings.

The diction portion will be conveyed by a selection of readings and drills on French, German, and Italian diction. Written and oral exercises will be administered to assist retention of the material. The particular needs of each singer will be addressed by the identification of specific areas in need of further study and practice, including suggestions as to how this should be accomplished.
