On Tuesday, April 18th, the Themes II Panel of the ASC Curriculum Committee and the Theme Advisory Group: Health & Wellbeing reviewed a course proposal for Sociology 2290.

The reviewing faculty unanimously approved the request with two recommendations:

- i. *Recommendation:* The reviewing faculty recommend removing the following sentence from the Disability Statement (syllabus pg. 5): "This course is designated as an in-person class and lectures will not be recorded.", as this is not a part of the Disability Services statement as required by the Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee (https://asccas.osu.edu/curriculum/syllabus-elements).
- ii. *Recommendation:* The reviewing faculty recommend that the department remove the D-from the grading scale (syllabus, pg. 7) as this grade cannot be assigned at Ohio State.

As a reminder, *recommendations* (in italics above) should be implemented when the course is next taught.

Sociology 2290 will continue through the approval process.
