Course Description

An introduction to Voice Acting, this class provides practical experience invocal performance through class exercises, discussions, observations, analysis, and interviews with professional guests. This class aims to challenge experienced performers and provide beginners with a basis for further study in vocal performance and insight into their own potential as a voice-over performer.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- 1. Develop the basic techniques of acting through voice.
- 2. Practice performance and technique through class exercises and outside projects.
- 3. Analyze text and character and make acting choices that enhance the narrative.
- 4. Expand vocal range and capabilities.
- 5. Engage with colleagues in giving and receiving thoughtful feedback.
- 6. Provide a basis for further study in vocal performance and insight into performer potential.
- 7. Understand the professional jobs associated with Voice Acting.

This course is a required course for the Voice Acting Minor and a THEATRE <u>elective</u> open to any undergraduate student with goodstanding, who has met the prerequisite and/or permission of the instructor. This course is *not* aGeneral Education course at The Ohio State University.

How This Course Works

Mode of delivery: This course is delivered in-person. A weekly engagement can be found on the Carmen discussion board and can be completed around your own schedule during the week. Students will attend class where they will observe sample work, participate in discussions, interview professional guests, and engage in practical exercises where they will perform and give/receive peer feedback. Students are expected to come to class having completed the homework.

Pace of activities: This course is divided into weekly modules that are released one week ahead of time.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 3 credit-hour course. According to Ohio State bylaws on instruction (go.osu.edu/credit hours), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to [6] hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of [C] average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Research shows regular participation is one of the highest predictors of success. With that in mind, I have the following expectations for everyone's participation:

- Attendance: required
 - You are expected to be in class. Three absences and each absence after that, equals reduction of 1/3 of a letter off your final grade. See me with concerns or special circumstances.
- Office hours: optional Email me to secure a time to meet via Zoom. I'll do my best to meet with you – even on short notice.
- Participating in discussion forums: one or more times per week
 As part of your participation, each week you can expect to post at least once as part of our substantive class discussion on the week's topics. The can range from posting YouTube clips, commenting on a post, or offering feedback to a classmate.

Descriptions of Major Course Assignments

- <u>1. Group Interview of Professional Guest:</u> Students will take turns leading the discussion with professional guests in small groups. Questions need to be prepared ahead of time and emailed to the instructor 24 hours before the interview.
- <u>2. Immersion Days:</u> There are five days in class where students will try out skills and techniques for a particular aspect of each of the applications listed below. All activities will take place at home or on campus. You will need a way to record your voice and upload the file to Carmen; a cell phone or computer will work fine.
 - Animation, Video Games, and MoCap/PCap
 - Commercial and Promo
 - Narration and Podcasting
 - Film/TV Looping
 - Audiobooks



<u>3.Immersion Posting:</u> Students will post the finished product of their immersion days to the appropriate Carmen discussion-board. These posts contain the student-created, sample-work made for the units on Animation, Video Games, and MoCap/PCap, Commercial and Promo, Narration and Podcasting, Film/TV Looping, and Audiobooks. In addition to posting their own work, students are required to watch all projects in preparation for class peer-feedback.

<u>4.Engagements on Carmen discussion-board:</u> Students will engage with discussion threads on Carmen. Activities will range from finding and posting voice acting examples, to responses (minimum of 100-words) to current trends/events in Voice Acting, to class checkins. There will be 5 engagements over the course of the semester counting for (4) points each.

Late Assignments

Please refer to Carmen for due dates. Due dates are set to help you stay on pace and to allow timely feedback that will help you complete subsequent assignments. If you are unable to attend class, use Carmen discussion threads to switch times with a classmate, otherwise we will find time to work in a subsequent class or meet outside of class. Note that it may not be possible to provide you with an equivalent experience if you miss an Immersion Day, but we can attempt to create an alternative assignment.
