2. <u>Rationale</u>

• Rationale/purpose:

The purpose of the certificate is to provide students with a robust introduction to the discipline of Black Studies, including the field's geographic and demographic scope, methods and modes of analysis, topical and thematic concerns, applications to interdisciplinary teaching and learning, and commitments to community outreach, engagement, and activism.

Identify a likely source of student demand for the proposed certificate and provide one or two examples.

- This certificate aims to serve three primary student populations:
 - 1. **Teachers**, who would like to integrate Black Studies content into their curricula and pedagogy. The certificate would provide these teachers with relevant disciplinary content and a credential to complement any existing degrees they might have.
 - a. One target group among teachers is Advanced Placement African American Studies instructors. The College Board is currently piloting a new AP course in this subject area, and we anticipate growing demand

in complementary degree programs (such as our proposed certificate) as this new course of study develops and expands.

- b. It is worth noting that the proposed AP course in African American Studies is similar in structure and content to AFAMAST 1101 (Introduction to African American and African Studies), a required core course for this certificate. Additional core and elective coursework would complement AFAMAST 1101 with relevant area, demographic, conceptual, topical, and applied content.
- 2. Community members, including seniors looking to pursue further focused study in the discipline and high school graduates looking to explore African American and African Studies (AAAS) as a bridge to future college study.
- **3.** Non-educator working professionals, engaged in a variety of fields who could benefit from foundational study in AAAS to better serve their clients and communities. Possible target groups include social workers, medical professionals, religious leaders, school counselors, lawyers, financial managers, police officers, community organizers, and city officials.
- We believe that these three populations (teachers, community members, and non-educator working professionals) will bring unique, and uniquely relevant life and professional experience to the courses and program as a whole, which we feel will enhance the course of study for all involved.

- Upon completion of the academic certificate in Black Studies, learners will be better prepared to:
 - 1. understand and communicate the significance of Black Studies as a discipline, in terms of its history, scholarly breadth, and commitment to community activism and engagement.

 - 1. Direct Assessment: Final exam essay response

AFAMAST 1101, "Introduction to African American and African Studies," provides a comprehensive introduction to the discipline of Black Studies and is a required core course in this certificate. At the end of the course, students will take a final exam, covering content from throughout the semester. This exam will include the following essay question: "What is the significance of Black Studies? In your answer, address the discipline's history, scholarly breadth, and commitment to community engagement and activism." The instructor will use responses to this essay question to provide a direct assessment of students' ability to "understand and communicate the significance of Black Studies as a discipline." (See Appendix A for assessment document) 2. Direct Assessment: Ungraded reflection essay

The following reflection essay question will be submitted to students in the final weeks of AFAMAST 1111, "Introduction to Africa," and AFAMAST 1112, "Introduction to the Black World:" "How does the content of this course apply to your life and career path? What life lessons will you carry forward from this course? If you are a working professional, or studying toward a specific job or career, please indicate how this course material may impact and inform your working life. If you are a student and have not yet decided on a specific career path, how will this course inform your future studies?" AFAMAST 1111 and 1112 are required core courses for the certificate and provide in-depth introductions to current African Studies and African Diaspora Studies. This assessment will be conducted on alternating years for each course, as follows: AFAMAST 1111 in the first year, and AFAMAST 1112 the following year. After two years of assessment comparative data from the two course assessments will allow us to discern trends in student outcomes, which will become more robust and apparent as further assessments are made. (See Appendix B for assessment document)

3. Indirect Assessment: Certificate program completion survey

When students have completed the 12-credit certificate program, the program coordinator in AAAS will ask students to complete an anonymous online survey. This survey will include the following questions:

- 1. What is your current professional status?

- 3. In what ways will this certificate program impact and inform your relationship to and engagement with communities of African descent in your neighborhood, at your school / university, or at your workplace? Provide at least three examples.

• Following a thorough survey of Africana, Black, and African American and African Studies programs nationally, we found no certificate programs that match our proposed certificate in Black Studies, in terms of both curriculum and mode of delivery. Five programs offer graduate certificates, not comparable to our undergraduate curriculum. Five further programs offer undergraduate certificates (all in Ohio), but none of these are delivered online. In sum, our proposed certificate is unique in terms of its proposed curriculum (Black Studies at the intersection of African American, African Diaspora, and African Studies) and mode of delivery (with both online and in-person options). (See Appendix D for the results of our survey of certificate programs in related fields)

• We anticipate 100 students per year at the program's peak, including teachers, post-high school community members, senior community members, and non-educator working professionals. Early enrollments are expected to be smaller as we grow and advertise the program, with perhaps a greater number of local community members and non-educator professionals initially. We are also anticipating the formal launch of the new AP course in African American Studies, which we believe will increase demand for our certificate program among teachers nationally.

Appendix H: List of Course Requirements for Certificate Completion

The certificate will be composed of three required courses and one elective, all offered within the Department of African American and African Studies (12 total credit hours). There are no prerequisites.

The three required courses are:

- 1. AFAMAST 1101 (Introduction to African American and African Studies, 3 credits)
 - Current course
 - Offered online (DL) and in-person
 - Course description: Introduction to the scholarly study of the Africana experience, focusing on patterns of resistance, adaptation, diversity, and transnational connections
- 2. AFAMAST 1111 (Introduction to Africa, 3 credits)
 - New course, approved with anticipated launch during AY22-23
 - Offered online (DL) and in-person
 - Course description: This course is a multidisciplinary introduction to the history, peoples, and cultures of Sub-Saharan Africa. Via a diverse set of sources and mediums, including films, literature, visual art, human rights reports, etc., students will be introduced to a number of important expressions, ideas, episodes, events, and trends in Africa, past and present.
- 3. AFAMAST 1112 (Introduction to the Black World, 3 credits)
 - New course, approved with anticipated launch during AY22-23
 - Offered online (DL) and in-person
 - Course description: This course introduces students to the history and present of the Black World, encompassing both the African continent and its diasporas. Students will explore the historical events and the racial ideologies that shaped global Blackness and examine political, cultural, social, and religious expressions among a variety of communities within the global African diaspora.

Possible elective courses: Any 2000-level or above course in AAAS. Online-only students may choose from the following DL course offerings:

- 1. AFAMAST 2081 (African American History from 1877, 3 credits)
 - Current course
 - Offered online (DL) and in-person
 - Course description: The study of the African American experience in the United States from the era of Reconstruction through the present.
- 2. AFAMAST 2218 (Black Urban Experience, 3 credits)
 - Current course
 - Offered online (DL) and in-person
 - Course description: Examination of contemporary black urban experience focused on the impact of persistent residential segregation, increasing class polarization, and the global force of hip hop culture.
- 3. AFAMAST 2367.04 (Black Women Writers: Text and Context, 3 credits)
 - Current course
 - Offered online (DL) and in-person
 - Course description: Writing and analysis of black women's literary representations of issues in United States social history.

Dear Colleagues in the Dept. of Teaching and Learning,

My name is Ryan Skinner. I direct Undergraduate Studies in the Dept. of African American and African Studies, and I am reaching out to you to request concurrence for a new online certificate program that AAAS is developing in "Black Studies."

Please find the draft proposal attached.

We are seeking concurrence with the Dept. of Teaching and Learning because one of our target populations for this program is teachers.

Let me be clear at the outset that our intent is not to teach teachers how to teach! That is your disciplinary purview.

Rather, we are offering our program participants (including, we hope, teachers) the opportunity to receive a thorough introduction to Black Studies as a discipline, in hopes that our discipline may be meaningfully integrated into our students' professional lives and future studies.

We anticipate our teacher population to mostly include high school educators. This is motivated in part by the College Board's recently announced Advanced Placement course in African American Studies.

We would like to provide eventual instructors of such a course with a rigorous, yet efficient introduction to the discipline of Black Studies, with a credential that would complement other degrees they might hold.

I attended the College Board symposium on this new AP course this past March, and I have met with College Board representatives, who are interested in the availability of programs such as the proposed certificate in Black Studies.

Of course, such a program may be of interest to teachers at other scholastic levels as well, and we would welcome their participation in our program. Again, our certificate is designed to introduce interested participants to the discipline of Black Studies, with an understanding that the knowledge and perspectives associated with this field may be employed in various ways.

As such, other target groups for this program include Black and African community members (in and beyond Columbus), for whom targeted study in the field may not have been available or possible in their high school or college/university, as we well as working professionals in areas outside of education, for whom the knowledge and perspectives of Black Studies may contribute to equity and justice initiatives in their workplaces, for example.
