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Good afternoon,

On Thursday, September 14th, the Natural and Mathematical Sciences Subcommittee reviewed the new Computational Physics certificate.

I am pleased to report that the Subcommittee approved the proposal with three contingencies and one recommendation:

- **Contingency:** The Subcommittee asks that a concurrence be sought from the Department of Computer Science and Engineering and the Department of Statistics. As a reminder, if no response is provided within two weeks, concurrence is assumed.
- **Contingency:** The Subcommittee asks that the department submit a quick course change request for Physics 5680 to add ECE majors to the list of majors in the prerequisites. It appears that the department intended to do this from the language within the proposal, but it has not taken place yet.
- **Contingency:** The Subcommittee asks that in curriculum.osu.edu and on page 3 of the proposal, the course program outcome language be amended. Currently, it appears as if the word “problems” is missing from the third program outcome. They are asking this be completed as these are the official documents of record.
- **Recommendation:** The Subcommittee recommends moving the “Course Pre-Requisites” language found on the advising sheet to the left-hand column. They believe this will make that language more visible to students and will encourage more students to seek the appropriate advising help should they wish to complete the certificate.

I will return the certificate proposal to the departmental queue via curriculum.osu.edu in order to address the above feedback.
