1. Introduction

The Department of East Asian Languages and Literatures (DEALL) in the College of Arts and Sciences offers MAs and PhDs in Chinese/Japanese literature, linguistics, and language pedagogy. We provide comprehensive and interdisciplinary academic training. Our nationally recognized language pedagogy program and faculty also provide strong training in language teaching. Because DEALL produces strong researchers who can teach language well, our graduates have been sought after by other Chinese and Japanese programs nationally and overseas. Drawing on our existing strengths, DEALL proposes a new graduate certificate on the teaching of East Asian languages and literatures (GRC-TEALL).

2. Purpose, significance, and rationale, and anticipated benefit

Purpose: The goals of developing GRC-TEALL are four-fold:

- To better prepare our graduate students to be more effective and more inclusive teachers.
- To expand our current strength in language pedagogy to the pedagogies of culture, literature, and linguistics.
- To make our graduates even more competitive in the job market.
- To enhance our already strong reputation in pedagogy training by offering a structured program.

Significance: The two most important missions of graduate programs like ours are to train graduates to become able to 1) conduct quality research and 2) teach future generations of students. East Asian language departments and our fields increasingly demand that new PhDs not only know their subjects well, but also that they be able to

convey their importance to students, stir excitement, and make them relevant to students' lives. Providing systematic pedagogy training to our graduate students is relevant and important to our mission.

Rationale: DEALL already has a strong reputation in language pedagogy training. We seek to create GRC-TEALL to remain a leader in producing outstanding scholars who have effective teaching skills.

- Our training in language pedagogy has been already widely recognized.
 - DEALL faculty lead in the publication of research and pedagogical materials. The most recent publications include the *NihonGo Now* textbook series, written by Prof. Mari Noda and published in 2020 and 2021.
 - DEALL has had several recipients of the Graduate School's Graduate Teaching Associate (GATA) Award. Yawei Li is the most recent recipient of the award in 2021-2022.
- A growing number of DEALL's literatures and linguistics faculty make significant contributions to teaching of East Asian cultures, literatures, and linguistics. For example:
 - Prof. Patricia Sieber (Chinese literature) is the lead editor of How to Read Chinese Drama: A Guided Anthology (Columbia University Press 2022). It is a volume in the "How to Read Chinese Literature" series, which aims to "transform the learning and teaching of Chinese literature, language, and culture in the English-speaking world."
 - In 2020, Prof. Naomi Fukumori (Japanese literature) undertook a 3-semester instructional design for her Japanese culture course under the Michael V. Drake Institute for Teaching and Learning Teaching Support program, and the course as a model is featured on their website.
 - With an ASC grant (2013-19), Prof. Charles Quinn created an interactive multimedia website for teaching and learning classical Japanese (https://cip.asc.ohio-state.edu/), a project that involved both undergraduate and graduate students.
 - The DEALL Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Committee, chaired by Prof. Meow Hui Goh, has hosted DEI pedagogy workshops for the teaching of East Asian languages and literatures in 2020-2021 and 2021-2022, featuring presentations by DEALL faculty and graduate students and by scholars from other universities. These workshops are offered as a continuing annual series.
- Nationally, more East Asian language programs are investing in pedagogy training for graduate students.
 - The East Asian Languages and Civilizations at the University of Chicago now has a detailed pedagogical training plan: https://ealc.uchicago.edu/graduate/pedagogical-training-plan

Anticipated benefits for participants:

- The certificate will provide opportunities for students to receive systematic training in teaching.
- The certificate will allow its participants to clearly show their commitment to teaching in job application materials.
- The certificate will enhance participants' chances for job placement.

3. Evidence of need, including opportunities for employment if applicable

- Other Chinese and Japanese programs across the country often contact us and ask whether we have students who can apply for the positions they have posted. They will appreciate our effort to train our students more broadly and systematically, especially in the teaching of culture, literature, and linguistics.
- Our students are already working with faculty individually and informally on their teaching of culture, literature, and linguistics by observing classes, developing syllabi, etc. A certificate program will provide a clear structure to help students develop teaching skills in a systematic and effective way.

4. Proposed curriculum (12 credits)

- (existing) EALL 7701: Pedagogical Syntax for East Asian Languages (3)
- (existing) EALL 7702: Materials preparation for East Asian Languages (3)

- (existing) EALL 7705: Seminar in the Learning of East Asian Languages and Cultures (3)

5. Prospective enrollment

Three to five students a year. DEALL annually admits four to six incoming graduate students to our programs. We expect at least 50% of all DEALL graduate students will complete the certificate by the time they graduate. Furthermore, we will open the certificate to all current MA and PhD students who specialize in Chinese and Japanese studies at Ohio State.

6. Completion process

DEALL offers EALL 8701 every year. Other EALL pedagogy courses, such as EALL 7700, 7701, 7702, 7703, 7705, and 7706, are offered at least biennially. In principle, a student can complete the certificate within two years, while also making progress on the required coursework for their degree. For a sample schedule, see Appendix 1.

8. Format

- The courses for the certificate will be offered on campus. (This is not an online certificate.)
- Students will begin and matriculate through the certificate program in a selfpaced manner.
- DEALL will not limit enrollment to a specific number of students. However, at the time of application, all applicants must: 1) have permission from the advisor to pursue this certificate; and 2) obtain permission from a faculty member with whom they plan to take a practicum course. (Practicum courses, required for Category B, are offered on an individual basis.)

9. Learning outcomes and an assessment plan

Learning outcomes

- Demonstrate understanding of issues related to teaching East Asian cultures, literatures, and linguistics.
- Acquire skills essential for teaching East Asian cultures, literatures, and linguistics.

Assessment:

- Mastery of learning outcomes will be demonstrated partly by the completion of each required and elective certificate course within a minimum of C- and of the courses continuing toward the certificate with an overall minimum of 3.0 average.
- 2) End-of-course departmental teaching evaluations in the required course, EALL 8701, will assess students' skills to teach East Asian language courses. See Appendix 4.
- 3) Recent certificate completers will receive surveys that solicit anonymous feedback on their perceptions of the impact that the certificate made on their understanding and skills to teach East Asian cultures, literatures, and linguistics. Students will have the opportunity to comment on the relative strengths and

- weaknesses of the courses that they completed toward the certificate. The survey questions are provided in Appendix 5.
- 4) Faculty will conduct informal email surveys of certificate alumni to determine how the certificate influenced professional careers and to solicit how the program might be improved.
