Course Description:

Since 2020, the Department of French and Italian at The Ohio State University has been recognized by the French Cultural Services in the United States and a panel of professors at prestigious institutions around the country as a member of the "Centers of Excellence network". This label recognizes the presence at OSU of a critical mass of highly skilled researchers and artists whose scholarship and creative activities take France and the Francophone world as their main object. Receiving financial and logistic support from the French Embassy, the Center of Excellence at Ohio State organizes cultural events throughout the year. Its activities are threefold. First, it invites thinkers, novelists, and scholars to share their work on campus or via Zoom. Second, it organizes the annual Jules Verne Writing Residency, which welcomes every year a French speaking writer to spend a period of three weeks on campus, a period punctuated by public lectures and participation in undergraduate and graduate classes. Finally, it leads regular interviews of French-speaking authors via *French Press*, its online literary show, which is supported by the French Cultural Services in the US and promoted on their official website.

Most of the activities for this course will be conducted in English, although intermediate-level reading comprehension is desirable for students to become familiar with authors' work. Prerequisite for undergraduate students: FR3101.

Undergraduate and graduate students registered for this course will receive one credit hour per semester for attending the Center of Excellence's events, lectures co-sponsored by the Center of Excellence, and subsequent discussions. The number of these lectures will vary from one semester to the next but will be no less than four and no more than six. When the Center of Excellence welcomes speakers to campus, participants will be expected to have lunch with them.

In addition, graduate students registered for this class will contribute to the *French Press* literary channel by being co-hosts during one recording at the Digital Media Studio in Hagerty Hall (which will take place on a Thursday from 1 to 2). In preparation for this interview, graduate students will read the guests' work, prepare questions that will be used during the interview, participate in one preparatory meeting on Zoom (one week before the interview) and contribute to the interview as the show's co-hosts.

Because it is different every semester, this course is repeatable up to ten times. Undergraduate students may count three credit hours (three semesters) of it toward their French or French and Francophone Studies major or, with permission from the instructor, their French minor. Graduate students are required to take at least three credits hours (three semesters) of it and are encouraged to take it more often for intellectual and professional development as well as for networking opportunities.

Expected learning outcomes

By the end of this course, students will:

- Identify new trends in French and Francophone studies.
- Engage meaningfully with literary and intellectual works produced by French and Francophone writers and scholars.
- Interact directly with the author of a work they discussed in class.
- Formulate stimulating questions about a contemporary cultural object.
- Identify the different components of a recording studio and recognize the technical process leading to the production and dissemination of a literary show.

How This Course Works:

Mode of delivery: Some of the required events will take place in person. In addition, some of the invited guests may share their work via Zoom. The recording sessions will take place at the Digital Media Studio in Hagerty Hall. The preparatory meetings will take place on Zoom one week before each *French Press* interview.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 1-credit-hour course. According to Ohio State policy, one semester credit is the equivalent of approximately 2,250 minutes (i.e., 37.5 hours) of course work for the semester, combining formalized instruction with out-of-class work. See the Course Schedule* below for a breakdown of the hours required for this course

Attendance and participation requirements: Your attendance is based on your activity and participation. Course Grade

The Center of Excellence Colloquium is graded Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory (S/U). To earn a satisfactory grade, participants must earn a **minimum of 85 out of a possible 100 points.** All assignments should be submitted as directed by the stated deadline. Late work will not be accepted unless prior arrangements have been made.

Description of Assignments:

Questions about the Readings (Undergraduate and Graduate Students): 25 points

Before each event organized by the Center of Excellence, participants will read an article, or a book chapter (around 10 to 15 pages) written by our guest and prepare one question (in English) for the Q&A. Participants will post their question the day before the event at 4:00pm on the Carmen Discussion Forum and give feedback to at least one classmate. They will lose five points if the question and the feedback are not posted by the deadline.

Attendance and Participation (Undergraduate and Graduate Students): 50 points

Participants are expected to attend all the events organized by the Center of Excellence. They will lose ten points per *unexcused* absence. Whenever possible, a recording of the event will be made available to participants. In case of an excused absence, participants will watch the recording of the event and write a "reflection exercise" about the talk (see below).

Reflection Exercises (Undergraduate Students only): 25 points

Participants will be provided with a link to each of the *French Press* interviews. They will watch each of these recordings and upload on Canvas a reflection exercise composed of two paragraphs (roughly 125 words each, in French). In the first paragraph, they will offer a summary of the interview, rephrasing the thesis and key evidence provided by the guest. In a second paragraph, they will share a critical reaction, outlining what they learned, what they found difficult to understand, and/or comparisons with previous *French Press* interviews. The reflection exercises will be sent by email to the instructor as a Word attachment no later than one week after receiving the link to the *French Press* interview. Participants will lose five points if the reflection exercise is not sent to the instructor by the deadline. They will lose five points if the reflection exercise is too short and/or does not follow the above-mentioned guidelines.

Being a French Press co-host (Graduate Students only): 25 points.

Each co-host will read the work discussed in a *French Press* interview and prepare five questions (in French) about it as well as a 250-word biography (in French) of the guest. Co-hosts will attend on Zoom one preliminary meeting (a week before the *French Press* interview) during which the questions and the biography will be workshopped and improved. They will lose 10 points if they do not send their five questions on time and lose 20 points if they miss the interview they are supposed to lead with the instructor (thus automatically failing the class).

As of today, some activities of the Center of Excellence in 2023-2024 are still to be determined. To give to the reviewing committee a better idea of what the course is about and a more comprehensive view of the type of events organized by the Center of Excellence, the syllabus below is based on the activities supported by the Center of Excellence in the past. Please note that our activities will change from one year to the next, but the schedule below is representative of the events we organize on a regular basis. Please note also that the complete reference to the article or book chapter to be read in preparation of an event will be added to the final version of the syllabus (these documents will be made available on Carmen before the beginning of the semester). For an in-person event, we count a total of 4 hours of contact (lunch + event); for a

Zoom event, 2 hours; for a *French Press* event, a 1-hour preliminary meeting and 1 hour at the recording studio. We thus reach a total of 22 hours of contact (20 hours for "Events" and 2 hours of contact per Graduate Student) plus 18 hours of homework (90 minutes of homework for each of the five Events [reading an article and preparing a question] + 90 minutes of homework for each of the seven *French Press* interviews [watching the recording and writing the Reflection exercises]). Graduate students participating as co-hosts to a *French Press* interview will be excused from writing the Reflection exercise.

Participants will be provided at the beginning of the semester with a copy of the works discussed during the *French Press* interviews.

Homework and Preliminary Meetings

- For each interview, two Graduate students will be co-hosts. Being a co-host means that the students will read the guest's work in its entirety and prepare five questions (in French) before the interview. In addition, co-hosts will prepare a 250-word biography (in French) of the guest. Co-hosts will receive a copy of the work at the beginning of the semester and contribute to the recorded interview by asking their questions to the guest of *French Press*.
- During the preliminary meetings, we will discuss the questions prepared by the participants, select 10 questions for the interview, and workshop the biography prepared by the co-hosts.
- Note: the instructor will make sure that everyone gets to be a co-host at least once. Depending on the number of participants and of guests, which will vary each semester, we may have up to three co-hosts per interview or have some students become a co-host a second time.
