On Wednesday, October 4th, the Themes 2 Subcommittee of the ASC Curriculum Committee reviewed a new GEN Theme: Citizenship for a Diverse and Just World request for History/AAAS 3083.

I am pleased to report that the Subcommittee unanimously approved the request with one contingency and two recommendations:

- **Contingency:** The Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee recently updated the list of required syllabus statements for all syllabi within the College to include a statement on religious accommodations. This new, required statement is a result of a directive by the Executive Vice President and Provost and [can be found here on the ASC Curriculum and Assessment Services website](#). The Subcommittee thanks you for adding this statement to your course syllabus.
- **Recommendation:** The reviewing faculty offer the friendly recommendation to update the Mental Health and Title IX statement. The most up-to-date [statements can be found here](#) on the ASC Curriculum and Assessment website.
- **Recommendation:** The reviewing faculty recommend more explicitly addressing throughout the course syllabus how students will engage with intercultural competence as it relates to being a global citizen.

I will return the proposals to the departmental queues via curriculum.osu.edu in order to address the Subcommittee's feedback.
