On Wednesday, October 18<sup>th</sup>, the Themes 2 Subcommittee of the ASC Curriculum Committee reviewed a new GEN Theme: Citizenship for a Diverse and Just World request for History & Jewish Studies 3480.

I am pleased to report that the Subcommittee unanimously approved the proposals with one recommendation:

- **Recommendation:** The reviewing faculty recommend removing individual people from the Grade Grievances section of the syllabus, as they are out-of-date, and utilizing only appropriate departmental titles.
