MUSIC 1111: Fundamentals of Music for Non-Music Majors

Course format: Lecture

Course description: Students will work to develop fluency with the fundamental materials of western tonal music. They will learn notational conventions pitch, rhythm, and meter. They will recognize, write, and label intervals, key signatures, and major and minor triads. Students will synthesize and apply these concepts in two four-measure compositions. This course is intended to serve students who wish to pursue a minor in music and who do not pass the theory placement exam.

Prerequisites: none

Course sequence information: A final grade of C- or better in this course fulfills the prerequisite for Music Theory 1 (Music 2021), which is required for the music minor.

Course goals: In this course, students will be able to...

- 1. Identify and write pitches written on staves and ledger lines using bass and treble clefs.
- 2. Recognize and write simple and compound intervals.
- 3. Understand rhythmic notation and write rhythms in simple and compound meters.
- 4. Recognize and write scales and key signatures.
- 5. Recognize and write triads.
- 6. Analyze and write triads using roman numerals, figured bass, and lead-sheet symbols.
- 7. Apply conventions of musical notation and fundamental music theory concepts in composing two four-measure compositions.

Required Materials:

- Subscription to Musition from Rising Software: <u>https://www.risingsoftware.com/musition/assessment</u>. Additional information about how to purchase Musition will be provided.
- Staff paper (available at OSU bookstore or print out from the web)
- Music notation software: e.g., MuseScore (free), <u>https://musescore.org/en</u>

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 1 credit-hour course. According to <u>Ohio State</u> <u>bylaws on instruction</u> (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 1 hour per week of time spent on classroom instruction in addition to 2 hours of homework completed outside of class for the average student to receive an average grade of C. Please keep in mind this time could be more or less depending on your prior experience with this content. You are expected to make continuous progress throughout the semester.

Practice assignments: You will have weekly untimed practice assignments in Musition. These are automatically graded so you will receive immediate feedback on your progress. Only your highest score of any attempt will count towards your final grade. You may take the practice assignments as many times as needed to achieve understanding and mastery of weekly concepts.

Skills assessments: You will take five timed skills assessments in Musition over the course of the semester. You may begin these assessments at any time and take them as many times as needed to pass them. Due dates for the first attempt are noted in the syllabus, but you can continue working on them until you obtain a passing grade of at least 80%. Only your highest score of any attempt will count toward your final grade. Assessment topics will include:

- 1. Notation (first attempt due 9/4)
- 2. Rhythm and Meter (first attempt due 9/18)
- 3. Scales and Key Signatures (first attempt due 10/2)
- 4. Intervals (first attempt due 10/16)
- 5. Triads (first attempt due 11/13)

The final deadline to take all skills assessments is December 10. There is no final exam.

Composition project: You will compose two four-measure melodies, one in a major key and one in a minor key, and harmonize them with I, IV, and V7 chords. The first draft of your melodies will be due on 10/23. The final draft of the melodies with harmonized chords will be due on 12/4.

Attendance: This class meets only one day per week, so you are allowed one unexcused absence per semester. Additional absences for reasons of illness, medical appointment, family emergency, religious observance, participation in varsity athletics, professional development may be excused at

the instructor's discretion with documentation. For each unexcused absence exceeding one, your final grade will be reduced by 5%.
