Good afternoon,

On Wednesday, April 10th, the Themes I Subcommittee of the ASC Curriculum Committee reviewed a GEN Theme: Lived Environments request for ENR 3500H.

I am pleased to report that the course has unanimously approved with two contingencies and one recommendation:

- **Contingency:** The reviewing faculty ask that all readings students are required to read be incorporated into the course calendar. They noted that, currently, it appears that there are readings in the reading list that were not mentioned within the course calendar.
- **Contingency:** The reviewing faculty asks that the Religious Accommodation statement be updated within the course syllabus. The new statement has been provided by the Office of Undergraduate Education and vetted by the Office of Legal Affairs. As a helpful reminder, the link at the end of the statement labeled "Policy: Religious Holidays, Holy Days and Observations" is a required part of the statement and must be included. The newly updated statement can be found on the [syllabus elements page of the ASC Curriculum and Assessment Services website](#).
- **Recommendation:** *The reviewing faculty recommend reducing the number of course outcomes/objectives, as they worry these many may be difficult to assess.*

I will return ENR 3500H to the School's queue in order to address the Subcommittee's feedback.
