On Monday, February 19th, the Themes II Subcommittee of the Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee reviewed new GEN Theme: Citizenship for a Diverse and Just World requests for Sociology 2368 and 3597.02. Please see below for the reviewing faculty's feedback.

Sociology 2368

The Subcommittee unanimously approved the request with two recommendations:

- **Recommendation:** The reviewing faculty recommend ensuring that the course number be adjusted to the new 2368 number on page 1 of the syllabus when it is provided to students.
- **Recommendation:** The reviewing faculty recommend updating the Student Life Disability Services statement, as it was updated for the 2023-2024 academic year. The most up-to-date statements can be found on the <u>ASC Curriculum and Assessment Services website</u>.

Sociology 3597.02

The Subcommittee unanimously approved the request with one comment, one contingency, and two recommendations:

- **Comment:** The reviewing faculty would like to ask the department if it may be helpful to update the prerequisite for the course. Currently, the prerequisite for the course is a general education course in quantitative reasoning. However, with the launch of the new General Education program, students may use either a quantitative reasoning *or* data analysis course to fulfill their GEN Foundation: Mathematical and Quantitative Reasoning or Data Analysis requirement. It could, potentially, be helpful to update the prerequisite to be "Completion of GEN Foundation: Mathematical and Quantitative Reasoning or Data Analysis".
- **Contingency:** The Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee recently updated their list of required syllabus statements for all syllabi within the College to include a statement on religious accommodations. This new, required statement is a result of a directive by the Executive Vice President and Provost and <u>can be found here on the ASC Curriculum and Assessment Services website</u>. The Subcommittee thanks you for adding this statement to your course syllabus.
- **Recommendation:** The reviewing faculty recommend removing letter grades A+ and F from the grading scale within the syllabus, as the university does not award these letter grades. Instead of the grade of "F", Ohio State awards the letter grade of "E".
- **Recommendation:** The reviewing faculty recommend updating the Student Life Disability Services and Mental Health statements, as they were updated for the 2023-2024 academic year. The most up-to-date statements can be found on the <u>ASC Curriculum and Assessment Services website</u>.

I will return Sociology 3597.02 to the departmental queue via curriculum.osu.edu in order to address the Subcommittee's feedback above while Sociology 2368 will continue through the approval process.
