On Friday, March 21st, the Themes II Subcommittee of the ASC Curriculum Committee reviewed a GEN Theme: Citizenship for a Diverse and Just World and High-Impact Practice: Research & Creative Inquiry request.

I am pleased to report that the Subcommittee unanimously approved the request with one comment and one recommendation:

- **Comment:** The reviewing faculty note that the subtitle of the course is not officially inputted within the curriculum.osu.edu submission form. They ask that the department work with the ASC Curriculum and Assessment Services office to correct this prior to the submission moving forward. This request has already been completed and the course has been advanced.
