On Wednesday, Nov. 26th, the Arts and Humanities 1 Subcommittee of the ASC Curriculum Committee reviewed a course change proposal for Latin 6891

The Subcommittee unanimously approved the request with two recommendations:

- The Subcommittee recommends providing additional information on the course assignments, especially the research paper, found on page 2 of the syllabus. Specifically, they recommend providing more information on the specific requirements of each assignment and the process for students to work with the instructor to determine their research paper topic.
- The Subcommittee recommends updating several course policy statements, as they have been recently updated. All statements can be found on the <u>ASC Curriculum and Assessment Services</u> website:
 - Student Life Disability Services (page 6 of the syllabus)
 - Mental Health (page 6 of the syllabus)
 - Diversity (page 5 of the syllabus)

As a reminder, *recommendations* (in italics above) should be implemented when the course is next taught. Latin 6891 will continue through the approval process to the Graduate School.
