## Good afternoon,

On Tuesday, April 15th, the Arts and Humanities 1 Subcommittee of the ASC Curriculum Committee reviewed a proposal to create a new AI Ethics and Society Certificate

I am happy to report that proposal was unanimously approved with the following comments, which have already been addressed administratively:

- a) Comment: The Subcommittee asks that the following be added to the advising sheet (p. 13 of the proposal):
  - 1. NOTE: While there are no prerequisite courses for the certificate as a whole, many courses below require prerequisites. Please consult the course catalog for details before enrolling.
- b) Comment: The Subcommittee asks that all course prerequisites be added to p. 7-8 of the proposal under "Curriculum Requirements". It *is* acceptable to note that that there is a "prerequisite-free" path through the certificate.

The certificate proposal is now ready to be reviewed by the full Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee; this will happen (per previous communications) on May 2nd.
