The maximum enrollment is 18 students for a seminar

Description/Rationale

Navigating the challenges of cancer can be overwhelming. This one-credit exploration course offers a safe and supportive space for freshmen who are personally affected by cancer or have a loved one facing the disease. Weekly one-hour sessions will introduce students to valuable resources and support systems, including expert speakers, peer support groups, and practical tools for coping. Topics covered will include emotional well-being, nutritional guidance, physical activity, and creative outlets. This course aims to empower students to build resilience and find community during a difficult time.

ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS

Weekly Reflection Journals (10 points per journal, 100 points total):

- Students will maintain a weekly reflection journal, documenting their thoughts, feelings, and insights gained from each session.
- Journals should include reflections on guest speakers, support group discussions, coping strategies, and personal experiences.
- Emphasis will be placed on thoughtful engagement with the material, rather than length.
- This assignment encourages self-reflection and processing of emotions.

Participation and Engagement (100 points):

- Active participation in weekly discussions, support group activities, and guest speaker sessions is essential.
- Points will be awarded for thoughtful contributions, respectful engagement with peers, and a willingness to share personal experiences (when comfortable).
- This component emphasizes the importance of community and peer support.

Resource Exploration and Presentation (75 points):

- Students will be paired together and choose a specific resource related to coping with cancer (e.g., a support organization, a website, a book, a creative arts therapy).
- They will research the resource and prepare a brief (10-15 minute) presentation to share with the class.
- Presentations should include a summary of the resource, its benefits, and personal viewpoint.

Personal Coping Plan (25 points):

- Students will create a personal coping plan that incorporates strategies and resources learned throughout the course.
- The plan should address emotional, physical, and social well-being.
- It should include specific actions, resources, and support systems that the student plans to utilize.
- This is a tool for the student to use in the future.
