On Tuesday, October 14th, the Arts and Humanities 2 Subcommittee of the ASC Curriculum Committee reviewed a course proposal for Dance 7406 to be approved for distance learning.

The Subcommittee did not vote on the proposal as they would like the following points addressed:

a. The Subcommittee remains unclear about the instructor's presence during the student reading small groups. Since these hour-long meetings are considered class time for this 4-credit course, and the course otherwise meets for only three hours per week, instructor participation during the reading groups is essential to ensure there is sufficient Regular and Substantive Interaction.
