Course Description

Course Objectives:

The aim of this course is to continue instruction in the general knowledge of the Uzbek anguage, as it is spoken and written today. During the classes, the spoken language of educated native speakers, as well as the contemporary literary language that is being used in newspapers, books and other means of mass media will be emphasized. This course will increase students' knowledge of the sound system, alphabet and the basic structure and practical use of the Uzbek language. Throughout the course, practice of all four language skills – listening comprehension, speaking, reading, and writing will be stressed extensively. Students will be exposed to authentic materials such as video clips and pictures showing the real cultural life of the Uzbek people during the classes. At the end of the quarter, students should be able to listen to more complex conversations, read and understand short and medium sized texts, engage in brief conversations on more complicated everyday topics, and write short, simple essays on familiar topics using the structures and vocabulary introduced in class.

Prerequisite: 101 or permission of instructor.

Teaching and learning strategies:

Class activities will be designed and molded in accordance with students' progress and levels of familiarity with the Uzbek language and with their particular needs and expectations from the course. The instructor will use the textbook to present basic grammar and will bring in outside sources to complement the exercises provided in that book. This will lead to a variety of practice activities and language tasks which will be used in class, such as grammar exercises, pronunciation practice, language games, reading and listening comprehension from real examples, such as movies, songs, role-playing, and small skits.

Tests, exams, and grades:

Unless otherwise stated, students' rate of success will be determined according to whether or not they can complete certain tasks without major communication problems. That is, if students communicate effectively using accurate grammar, pronunciation, etc., then the student will be deemed to have successfully completed the assigned tasks.

The final grade will be based on the student's preparation and participation in daily classroom work, projects, and exams testing the student's knowledge and proficiency. Each examination

consists of four parts: written, spoken, listening, and structures. The final grade will be determined according to the following components:

- Class participation: 10 %
 - Will be assessed on the basis of attendance in participation in class activities. Regular attendance is essential and expected. You are expected to be in class on time and be prepared. Active participation consists of volunteering answers, as well as participating appropriately and staying on task in pair and group work. Thus, mere attendance in class is not sufficient. Since classes are conducted in Uzbek, students are expected to speak Uzbek whenever possible.
- Homework: 10%
 - Homework will be assigned on a daily basis and will include handouts, small writing, reading, and writing assignments. Students are expected to take homework assignments seriously and to turn in assignments on time so that no student falls behind.
- Projects: 10%
 - Projects will include powerpoint presentations, mock websites, collages, etc.
- Bi-weekly Quizzes: 20%
 - All quizzes will be announced beforehand and are designed to make sure that all students are keeping up with the pace of the course
- Mid-term: 15%
 - A study guide will be provided beforehand.
- Final written exam: 20%
 - A study guide will be provided beforehand.
- Final oral interview: 15%
 - A final oral interview will be conducted by the class instructor and will cover <u>all</u> topics covered during the course.

All tests and assessments will be graded on a percentage basis. Missed tests or quizzes will count as 0% unless the absence can be verified with documented proof or was approved beforehand by the instructor.

Primary textbook: Azimova, Nigora. <u>Introduction to Uzbek</u>. Indiana University (available currently in beta form, will be available by Fall 2007)*

- 1. Nicholas Awde, Uzbek Dictionary and Phrasebook. Hippocrene Books, Inc. 2002.
- Kamran M. Khakimov, <u>Uzbek-English/English-Uzbek Dictionary</u> (Hippocrine Concise Dictionary).
- * Note: This textbook includes authentic video and reading texts, accompanied by tasks and communicative activities. Throughout the course, video materials filmed in different parts of Uzbekistan will be used along with TV programs, newspapers, and journals published in Uzbekistan.
